## The Buildwas Church 300 Restoration Project

The current building for Holy Trinity Buildwas dates from 1720 and replaced a medieval church. We are celebrating our church's 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2020. We wish to keep our church open for the use of the local community for future generations.

We have therefore set up a **Buildwas Community "Save our Church" Group** to organise activities to raise money for Buildwas Church as part of the Buildwas Church 300 Restoration Project, for two reasons:

• **Fundraising** is required to pay for the Parish Share just to keep the church open and running. The Parish Share pays for the mission and ministry in churches in the Lichfield Diocese including Buildwas i.e. the costs to employ members of the clergy to run regular services and give spiritual leadership to the local community.

• **Grants** are required for the renovation of the church tower, gravestones and other items in the graveyard, repairs to the roof, renovation inside etc. This will cost ~£100k. We need to raise money towards these in order to secure the grants. We have decided to concentrate on raising money for the church tower in the first instance, as it is leaking – this will prevent further damage to the fabric of the building. The estimated cost of tower repairs is £40,000.

## Inspection of Church Bells and Belfry helps determine our structural renovation plans

An inspection of the belfry tower and bells at Buildwas Church has been carried out by members of the Shropshire Association of Church Bell Ringers, to determine their state and the necessary repairs and renovations which need to take place, as part of the Buildwas Church 300 Renovation Project.

Former Bell Advisor, Peter Wollam, and his successor, Geoffrey Harding, met in the presence of Church Warden Juliet Bowen and the Rev. Peter Shaw, and climbed into the belfry area to conduct the examination. Their many years of expertise enabled them to furnish the church with detailed information about the nature, condition and history of the bells and their mechanisms, as well as conduct a survey of the belfry's walls and timbers.

The church bells were cast in 1846-47 by C and G Mears foundry in Whitechapel, London, and bear the inscription *'The gift of Walter Moseley Esq. and Reverend John Bartlett'*. The Whitechapel foundry is also where Big Ben (the Great Bell of the clock in Elizabeth Tower at the Houses of Parliament) was cast in 1858, just 11 years after the bells had been cast for Buildwas.

The bells at Buildwas comprise a treble, second and tenor and are so arranged as to be swung at a 180° angle (the act of swinging the bells at 360° would create too great a force for the timbers to withstand, according to Mr. Wollam and Mr. Harding).

The copper-tin alloy bells are mounted on timber frames, which, although have been determined require treatment for woodworm, are thought to be in sufficient working order, along with the various components for operating and housing the bells (subject to their lubrication and sensible maintenance), to enable bellringing to take place.

It has been decided at this time that a once-considered new system of bells is not required, though the ceiling holes through which the flax bell ropes pass will be widened as part of the renovations, to reduce friction and subsequent wear on the ropes. Further conclusions were reached about the belfry and bell tower itself, and upon inspection, the urgency of renovations to its structure became more apparent. Rotten floorboards were discovered in both the belfry and in the loft below, and it was recommended that crawling boards be laid in order to safeguard against floor weakness, in the interim time before the floors can be replaced. The timber framing of the belfry tower walls have shown deterioration to the point at which on the west gable, daylight is visible. The structural importance of these timbers makes their repair imperative. A further, decorative, horizontal timber has also fallen away, to expose a hole in the masonry, which in itself has deteriorated throughout the entire belfry. Being of cement base with mesh reinforcement, it has broken down and thinned in several areas. Exposed holes have allowed birds to colonise the tower, littering the floor with nesting materials, which require removal.

The results of the inspection have clarified the exact nature of repairs that are required and it is hoped that revealing the results of the inspection will highlight the urgency of such repairs and inspire continued and further support in our fundraising efforts.

There are plans to ring the bells in 2020 to commemorate the Victory in Europe (VE) Day in May, and Victory in Japan (VJ) Day in August.

## <u>Charitable Trust to advise Buildwas Church</u> <u>on restoration of our Churchyard</u>

The Beautiful Burial Ground Project — Caring For God's Acre

The charitable Trust, **Caring for God's Acre**, are advising Buildwas Church on highly prioritised renovations and improvements to its churchyard, via a specially run National Lottery funded project.

The Shropshire-based organisation provides advice and assistance to churches and other organisations in the preservation of burial sites, in the interests of wildlife, communities and historical heritage. As part of an initiative called the **Beautiful Burial Ground Project**, the organisation has offered to visit our churchyard in September to provide suggestions, following an approach from Church 300 Project Secretary, Nigel Bowen.

Buildwas Church has long-since been working towards improvements in the outdoor area surrounding the church, with the organisation of a voluntary work party, who maintain the area periodically; liaising with the local council to arrange grass cutting; and facilitating a clean-up visit from cadets from RAF Shawbury.

The Beautiful Burial Ground Project Advisors will provide further ideas on how to preserve wildlife such as slowworms in the area, whilst still clearing and tidying foliage in the yard as a whole, as well as how to make the area appealing to tourists and improve disability access. There are also plans for events in 2020

aimed at families, to help them count the flora and fauna present as part of the National Biodiversity Project, and to learn more about the wildlife present, such as rare butterflies and slowworms.

Existing plans are to tidy overgrown areas of foliage and to repair and clean damaged gravestones of untended graves of those who have no surviving relatives who visit them. Attempts to contact all surviving relatives of untended graves must be made before some repairs can take place, and Shropshire Council will also be asked to maintain particular areas of the churchyard for which they are responsible.

It is hoped that the community will pull together to make it all possible.
